### Flexible Seating? Alternative Seating? YES!!!

One of the goals of Franklin Community Education Foundation is to support students and youth in the Franklin community to enhance their academic experience. Through Covid, unfortunately learning and opportunities outside the school were limited. Some forward-thinking teachers explored how to enhance their students learning in the classroom. This past year has been the year of requests for FLEXIBLE or ALTER-NATIVE SEATING.

Some research is being done now to show the benefits of flexible seating. Flexible seating can take any form that breaks from the traditional set up of all students sitting in traditional school chairs and desks. Floor cushions, scoop seats, bench cushions, wobble chairs, yoga balls, and bouncy bands around desks legs or chair legs are just some ways to incorporate alternative seating in any age classroom.


Some of the noted benefits of alternative/flexible seating include:

- **The Power of Choice** giving students some choice over their learning environment fosters a sense of empowerment and encourages "buy in" of learning objectives.
- Improved Sensory and Physical Health- We know that kids need to move!! Not only to get the wiggles out but for their health. Seats that rock, bounce, lean or are standing will help encourage this, subconsciously, for children. These opportunities will help with core strength. Also, when we move, the blood flow to the brain is increased – which in turn helps with concentration, memory and on task behavior.
- **Comfort Helps with Focus-** When students can choose their own seat, they are also able to find a seating arrangement that works best for them. This means that they are more likely to be comfortable, which can lead to improved focus and concentration, staying on task, and being more productive.



Sharing Is Caring- Flexible seating can lead to more of an essence of community. This will help students practice the concept of sharing and taking turns. This can also lead to development of problem solving skills, communicating and conflict resolution.

The FCS faculty is embracing the concept that MOVEMENT IS THE KEY TO LEARNING. Here are some of the alternative seating options FCEF has supported recently:





#### FCEF Collaborates with the Franklin Treadwell Recreation Commission

During the summer of 2022, the Franklin Treadwell Recreation Commission hosted swimming lessons for infants to teens. A total of 56 children from 19 families were able to take advantage of these lessons. The skill of swimming is not only a recreational milestone for children, but also a necessary life-saving, water-safety skill. The ability to swim provides a




person with gross motor skills, coordination, social skills, strength, cognition, and best of all confidence. In an effort to help promote this important skill among Franklin's youth, the Franklin Community Education Foundation paid for half of each child's lesson fees.
